Background:

Sue Abderholden leads NAMI-MN and Lisa Harrison-Hadler leads the Office of Ombudsperson for People with MH and Disabilities.

Lisa and Sue have been receiving an increasing number of calls from families who are being threatened with having their children removed from their care due to having a child boarding in a hospital.

This threatening practice is not something our hospital leaders or the state endorse and yet it continues to happen

NAMI Minnesota and the Ombudsman for Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities are seeing an increasing number of families being referred to child protection because the families cannot take a child home from the ED or an inpatient unit because they are not able to access the services and supports to keep the child and other family members safe. They face long wait lists for intensive services, such as residential treatment. A MNChoice assessment can take months. These families are not neglecting their children, the system is. We all know that the children's mental health system is in crisis and that children cannot access the right level of care at the right time. Referring these children to child protection does not magically connect the child to the services needed. Instead, it causes harm to the family. Parents may lose their jobs over the report being made, and some counties have threatened to remove all the children from their homes. In 2023 NAMI Minnesota and the Ombudsman worked with DHS on this issue. While we had wanted legislation, we agreed to DHS making changes in their screening instructions to prevent this from happening. Here is the information in the DHS document:

Situations where parents or guardian/s are seeking services needed to keep a child safe or meet the child's needs but are unable to access necessary services should not be screened in as neglect. When screening these reports, local welfare agencies should consider whether the issue is due to lack of service options for families or lack of capacity within appropriate treatment options. Examples of situations that may be a result of systemic capacity issues may include, but are not limited to a child:

- Reported to be in an emergency department or hospital setting due to mental and/or behavioral health needs and cannot be safely discharged to their family; however, there is a lack of treatment or support options available. Family is seeking services, or recently has sought services, or the child has been placed on a waiting list, and maintains ongoing contact with their child and the local welfare agency, if already involved.
- Currently located in a facility requesting parent/guardian pick up or transport to another facility and the parent/guardian is unable to meet the child's needs if they return home or the child's behaviors/needs are a risk to others in the home, and a facility or resource for placement is not available.

While these reports are not appropriate to screen in for a child protection response, a voluntary children's mental health or child welfare referral may be helpful to support families in accessing services.

We urge hospitals and counties to end this practice and to follow the screening guidelines. There is no reason to refer families to child protection when they are trying to access services and have placed their children on waiting lists.


